### **Pastoral Reflection**

#### Reflection for the New Year: Seeking Christ in All Things

#### Theophany House Blessings

It is the custom of many Orthodox Christians to have their homes blessed during the Theophany season with water blessed during the special festal services. When the parish priest comes to bless a home, he uses an ancient prayer of the Church asking the Lord, "to keep safe from all harm those who dwell here, bestowing on them Thy blessing, purification, and bodily health, and granting all their petitions which are for their salvation and eternal life."

We prepare an appropriate place in our homes for the very short service to be sung: a table should be prepared with a clean white cloth, a bowl with holy water, a candle, and an icon or a cross. The priest himself will have holy water, candles, and an icon with him, in case they are needed. A list of the baptismal names of everyone in the family is useful because we sing Many Years at the end of the House Blessing. Televisions and radios ought to be turned off, of course. A member of the family may carry the bowl of holy water and lead the priest through the house as we bless and sing.

At one time, the parish priest would come to every house in the parish as a matter of course, and the days following Theophany would see a veritable parade up and down streets in the neighborhood. It was a festive time and a time for visiting. Alas! Times and circumstances have changed, and houses are only blessed upon specific request. You can make such a request by



filling out the form below and submitting it to the parish office. At the very least people should collect Holy Water at church, bring a jar or some sort of container, from January 6 - 17, to use prayerfully at home.
