

## **Pastoral Reflections**

November in the Orthodox Church is a spiritually rich and significant month, filled with opportunities for deepening one's faith and participation in sacred traditions. One of the central practices in November is the Nativity Fast, which begins on November 15. This forty-day fast, also known as the Advent or Christmas Fast, is a period of preparation leading up to the birth of Christ. It is a time of self-discipline, reflection, and spiritual renewal, during which we are called to abstain from certain foods, focus on prayer, and practice acts of charity. By embracing the fast, we prepare our hearts and minds for the joy of Christ's coming into the world.

One of the most important feast days in November is the Entry of the Theotokos into the Temple, celebrated on November 21. This feast commemorates the presentation of the Virgin Mary to the Temple by her parents, Joachim and Anna, where she was consecrated to God's service at a very young age. It is a time to reflect on the purity, dedication, and holiness of the Theotokos, who would one day become the mother of our Savior. This feast reminds us of the importance of offering our own lives to God and the blessings that come from wholehearted devotion.

In addition to these spiritual practices, our community also celebrates an annual Thanksgiving Akathist, a service of praise and gratitude. This beautiful and moving service provides an opportunity to express our thankfulness to God for His many blessings, both seen and unseen. The Thanksgiving Akathist is a joyful expression of our faith, reminding us to cultivate an attitude of gratitude in all aspects of our lives.

As we enter this meaningful month, we warmly welcome everyone to participate in these sacred traditions. Whether through fasting, attending the feast of the Theotokos, or joining us for the Thanksgiving Akathist, November offers countless opportunities for spiritual growth and community. May this season be a time of renewal and blessing for all, as we prepare our hearts for the coming of Christ.

## 2024 Georgia Pilgrimage

We had thirteen people on our pilgrimage in Georgia (October 4 - 16): Fr. Andrew and Fr. Paul and Amy Hodge, Nina Stenach, Jim Varian, Olga Grigoriants, Mark and Judy Labine, Bernie and Chris Gulachek, Andrew and Joni Hinton, and Patrick Stewart (from Santa Rosa, CA). We were joined for the first weekend by Simon Liedtke (currently doing graduate work in Sweden) and for the last several days by Joe, Barb and Joanne Neumann.

The first part of the trip headed east to the monastery of St. David Garedja, the beautiful town of Sighnaghi, the Bodbe monastery to pray at the tomb of St. Nina and Liturgy, St. Elias Monastery on a mountain near Dedoplistskaro, Archangel Michael monastery at Gremi, the extraordinary monastery at Nekresi, Alaverdi Cathedral, Ikalto and the New Shuamta monastery. Returning briefly to Tbilisi overnight, we then headed more or less west to the Poka monastery and the small convent on Saghamo Lake with its newly restored church of St. Jonah, the cave city of Vardzia, and monastery at Upper Vardzia, the very cool cave complex and churches at Samertskhle/Tavtsula, Akhaltsikhe (and a delightful program of youth choirs and traditional dance in the Rabati Castle), Borjomi, ShioGvime monastery, Uplistsikhe, and of course Dzvari, Samtavro and the tomb of St. Gabriel the Fool for Christ, and Mstkheta.

On the 14th we attended the Liturgy for the altar feast of the cathedral - Svetitskhoveloba - along with hundreds of others. As well as monasteries and antiquities, we visited several vineyards and wineries, many really fabulous small kitchens and restaurants, renewed and

made new friendships, and enjoyed the gorgeous October weather and amazing landscapes. Everywhere the fruit trees (apples, quince, plums, pomegranate, persimmon, figs) were heavy with fruit even as the last of the grapes were being harvested and crushed.

A Georgian pilgrimage in 2025 is being planned for late May early June. A preliminary discussion: Oct. 27 in Father Andrew's office, and anyone interested should contact him by Nov. 27.

## **President's Column**

On Sunday, September 8, Bishop Benedict was with us to celebrate the feast of the Nativity of the Theotokos. On behalf of Archbishop Daniel he awarded orarions to Matthew Collodora, Thomas Grey and Patrick Ketz. During the Liturgy the Georgian singing group Zedasche sang some hymns and in the evening presented a beautiful concert of sacred Georgian music.

On September 20th & 21 we held our festival. It was really a wonderful time for us and our surrounding community. Thank you very much to the organizers and workers. It was especially wonderful to see young people helping, especially all of the work they did helping to set up. It was also nice to see people new to our parish participating, all of us working together, enjoying ourselves, meeting, and enjoying the company of our neighbors and others who attended.

At Vespers the evening of September 14, the Feast of the Elevation of the Cross, Archbishop Daniel representing the Holy Synod of Bishops of the Orthodox Church in America awarded Fr. Andrew the right to wear the mitre, in recognition of his many years of dedicated priestly ministry to the people and parishes he has served.

He discussed the historical development of the use of the mitre and stated that "it represents a crown, a crown of glory, the crown of the emperor, but when we look at this mitre we should see another crown as well, we should see the only crown that Christ himself ever wore, and that was a crown of thorns. Because as we know, the life of the priest is a life of suffering with the suffering Lord."

Reflecting on this comment I think it bears remembering that oftentimes, it is our priests that we depend on in the worst times of our lives, but we don't often think of what a burden it can be on them, to pray for and support all of us.

So Fr. Andrew, on behalf of all of us in our parish community, Axios! May God Grant You Many Blessed Years!

### Parish Home Improvement Update

October 21, 2024 Here is an update on the parish home improvement projects. 414 17th Avenue N.E. All of the identified projects have been completed. The only items that will be addressed in the next few months are: the possible installation of a shower unit in the lower level of the home, installation of a sliding door from the dining area to a deck on the south side of the home.

1630 5th Street N.E. General Contractor Jim Curry has begun work on the home. Electrical work is being done, a painting bid will be received, and floor refinishing and plumbing work will be bid and completed. All cabinetry, flooring, and countertops have been ordered and all other necessary renovating items dealing with fixtures, appliances, etc. were ordered in late October. Shades/blinds will be ordered as well. An egress window will be installed in the lower level of the home, creating an appropriate bedroom space. Adding a shower unit in the lower level is also being pursued. We will look for "Black Friday" specials when purchasing a refrigerator, microwave, and dishwasher. The washer and dryer are relatively new and do not need to be replaced. Jim Curry, General Contractor is looking at a completion date of December 20, 2024.

The Parish Home Improvement Team members, Tim Kaseno, John Jurichko, Ray Borchardt, and I thank the Board of Trustees for their support in this project. The treasurer and financial officers have been very flexible providing timely payment to all contracted individuals. As team leader, I request that the Board of Trustees work directly with the Parish Finance Committee to create an updated and new message to parishioners regarding the need for people to donate to the project. We all know that there are numerous needs within our parish and that people do respond when they are asked or gently reminded of needed funds. Submitted by: Alice Woog.

### **Choir Notes**

"The soul is restored to health by silence. It is therefore necessary to train oneself to silence—and this is a labor that brings sweetness to the heart. It is through silence that a man reaches peace from unwanted thoughts." (St. Isaac the Syrian 7th cent.)

I came across this quote on Facebook, one of the myriad of priests had posted it and it spoke to me. So, I saved it and when I sat down to write for you, there it was! Now, I share it with you.

Perhaps it's odd for silence to be a topic on a choir notes page, and I hesitate to associate the following reflection with the above quote as there's a high probability that I've missed the point, yet again. Still, singing has an element of silence to it. There are the obvious rests and breaks in music that, when used well, add to the musicality of the music. But the element of silence goes deeper than that. Consider, for a moment, silence as something more than just the absence of sound. Consider silence as stillness, or more specifically, inner stillness, a state mentioned quite a bit by the desert Fathers. Stillness is found when we turn away from the noise and anxieties and energies of the world focusing, instead, on the stillness that lies underneath. When one is able to fully immerse oneself in this stillness, focus, comfort, strength, support, and a realigning of one's thoughts, follows.

But, singing...? Perhaps I've mentioned tension before: we have all sorts of muscles in our neck, head, and shoulders and it is difficult to be aware of them enough to actually release all the tension they hold. Similarly, it can be difficult to be still and the more we practice, the deeper into the stillness we can go. As we try to immerse ourselves into inner stillness, we may find or feel things holding us back; thoughts, emotions, opinions, hard- heartedness, self-consciousness. And, just like when we let go of these things and ease deeper into stillness, releasing muscle-tension layer by layer turns singing into a whole new, joyful experience the further we go.

Stillness finds its way into another aspect of singing. In our common tongue, when someone has to sing a long note, we would say they're, "holding the note." This can be a bit of a misnomer as the word "holding" implies the use of muscles, the application of tension. If one were to apply this concept to that long note, the voice would get choked out and dragged down. Instead, it would be better to apply the concept of stillness. But first, we must understand stillness, in this sense, as being something that is not static (think of a guard standing stiffly at attention). No, we're talking about a dynamic stillness, like a cloud in the sky that has form but is not rigid, it just exists. So, perhaps instead of asking a singer to, "hold this note." It might be better to say, "be still on this note." The result here would be an extended note that sounds like it is

just there, effortlessly floating along to the heavens. Or, in the case of the basses and lower altos, hovering over the waters like an early morning fog.

It would be remiss of me, in the month of November, not to mention gratitude. I'm sure Father's column and the President's column will speak to the topic so I will not belabor it, but as painful as it may be to talk about feelings, something should be said. I hesitate to point out that singing in the choir is completely voluntary. Though there are rules and expectations to follow once one decides to sing with the choir, there is no contract. So, everything that the singers have given up to fill the church with music striving to reach the heavens is their gift to the rest of us. But, I suppose you already knew that and I thank you for your patience with me as I slowly figure things out. Thank you, everyone, for your love and support (I'd thank you for your understanding but I don't even understand myself sometimes). To the singers, thank you for your talents that enrich the services of the church. Thank you, for the time you've given up to come to rehearsals, sing at services, read emails, practice music at home, and for humoring me as we try varying exercises that improve vocal technique; it's a process. Though, I am only the director until God sends someone else, I am thankful for the opportunity and the time that He has given me to be with you and this village. It has been a blessing to stop moving from state to state and to lay down some roots. It has been even more of a blessing to lay down those roots here. Thank you, and have a blessed Thanksgiving.


